

# **WPS Update**

May 2018

The mission of the Wolcott Public Schools is to promote the academic, social, and emotional development of all students to become contributing members of the global community.

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#### From the Board Chairman & Superintendent:

We'd like to take this opportunity to clear up some misconceptions that occurred during recent budget hearings. On Tuesday, June 5<sup>th</sup>, the Town Council approved a budget that reduced the Board of Education's request by \$200,000. As we've mentioned to you in prior communications, this will unfortunately have an impact on resources and services for the classroom. At its next meeting, the Board will work to address the cuts received from the Council and will strive to cut where the least negative impact will occur for students.

Over the past ten years, the Board of Education has made substantial cuts in efforts to control costs. Administrators have been cut. Teachers have been cut. Resources have been reduced. We've turned over every proverbial rock to find efficiencies in facilities, energy, and operating costs. In fact, the 2018-2019 budget proposes to spend \$200,000 less on operational costs than we did five years ago. These efficiencies are due to ongoing efforts by our district leaders who take seriously their commitment to Wolcott's children and taxpayers. As an example, our school system has been recognized with Energy Star certification for all five of our buildings and conservation efforts have netted \$2,000,000 in savings over a five-year period.

At Tuesday's Town Council meeting, a statement was made that the schools can deliver all of the current programming with a \$300,000 cut. This statement is factually inaccurate. On March 14, 2018, the Finance Committees of the Board and Council held a joint meeting. At this meeting, the full Board budget was presented. Council members had an opportunity to scrutinize every line item and all questions were answered with facts about the Board's expenses. It was thoroughly explained to the Council members at this meeting and also at our presentation to the full council that costs we could not control were going up: special education and medical benefits among others. If all that the Board and Superintendent did was propose a continuation of the 2017-2018 services, our requested increase would have been 4.2%. This is connected to increases in special education, energy, benefits, and contracted salaries. But, the Board and Superintendent worked together to delay projects and purchases that lowered this request from 4.2% to 3.03%. The Board and the Superintendent work

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hard over a three-month period to create a budget that represents the needs of the students; nothing more, nothing less. There is no "padding" to fall back on.

Also, there was mention during the Council meeting of a forensic financial audit of the Board. All residents should take comfort in the fact that Connecticut law requires an independent audit by external accountants of every board of education once per year. The Wolcott Board of Education has had perfectly clean audits for more than ten years with no "findings" that would indicate any type of impropriety or faulty accounting procedures.

In closing, we'd like to assure you that the Board and Superintendent will continue to collaborate in their quest to provide the best education possible for the children of Wolcott within the funds that are apportioned to us by the Town Council. We'd like to thank the members of the community who have been active during the budget process. We appreciate your support.

#### **Alcott School:**

Students recorded their observations at the four stages of development, from the egg stage through the butterflies emerging from the chrysalis. The students looked closely at the rocks with a magnifying glass and recorded their findings. The students worked in groups to discuss what they observed and identified similarities and differences.

Tyrrell Middle School has been abuzz with a variety of positive curricular and extracurricular activities over the last several weeks. Grade 6 language arts classes, students in Ms. Tedeschi and Mrs. Wilson's classes have been focusing on effective argument writing by researching "homelessness in America". Throughout the unit, students read a variety of texts and watched video clips that provided examples of varied degrees of how individuals respond to the needs

of others. The goal was for students to understand and appreciate multiple perspectives and develop a meaningful, coherent written argument using evidence from credible sources.

As an extension, students collaborated with our social worker Mr.



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Cianchetti and also Mrs. Conway to learn about community resources available to those that may be in need within our town. A trip to the Wolcott Food Pantry afforded students an opportunity to participate in a source of support for those in need right here in the Wolcott community. Students toured the pantry, learned about its function in town and helped organize some of the donations that were collected at Tyrrell.

Throughout this unit, students were focused on increasing knowledge and skill development aligned to language arts standards, while also reinforcing respect, empathy, and citizenship.

On a different note, the Tyrrell Middle School baseball team had a 9-1 season and won the Junior NVL Conference by beating Long River Middle School of Prospect in the championship game. The Tyrrell softball team had a strong season as well going 7-1, and have made it to the conference championship where they will be playing Seymour Middle School for the Junior NVL crown.

# Student Learning & Teaching:

**Spotlight on Math Instruction.** Teachers and students in grades K-8 are concluding their second successful year using the new district-wide math program titled, *enVision Math 2.0*. Utilizing cutting-edge adaptive technology, *enVision Math 2.0* helps students build a stronger conceptual understanding of math while providing more opportunities for problem-based learning. Students and teachers have enjoyed the personalized math practice and homework features, as well as the online, step-by-step tutorials available through the MathXL and "My Practice Buddy" components of the program. In the month of May alone, district usage reports show 400 teacher logins and approximately 850 student logins to the online portal for lessons and support. The district is also using the *enVision 2.0* resource to support Algebra I instruction at the high school and is planning on expanding into Geometry and Algebra II classes over the next two years.
