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From the Board Chairman & Superintendent:



On behalf of the Board of Education, we'd like to thank all of our staff, students, and parents for their patience during the long period while we rebuilt our computer network. The malware attacks of June and September were widespread and severe. They impacted all facets of our operations from the classroom to the school office, central office, business office, and cafeterias. During the six weeks of repair work, our local information technology staff worked long hours and weekends alongside outside contractors and experts making the necessary repairs and rebuilds.

Teachers have displayed high levels of professionalism and flexibility during this time. Many teachers lost years of saved lesson plans and assessments. During the outage, teachers and students who'd become accustomed to technology-rich lessons showed creativity and patience as they reformatted these lessons in the absence of Chromebooks and projectors. School secretaries found new, inventive, and accurate ways to ensure that attendance was correct and that internal and external communications were happening as much as possible. Cafeteria staff kept accurate records of meal choice and later entered these into our new Solana system once it was up and ready. School administrators kept information flowing in the absence of email. While it was a painful and trying experience, I'm happy to report that our staff rose to the challenge and that meaningful learning continued in all of our classrooms.

We are nearly done rebuilding our system and still working out smaller issues each day. This unfortunate occurrence has given us the chance to build our systems more securely and robustly. While it is scary to know that another attack cannot be fully stopped and could happen at any time, we are in a better position to respond and limit the potential damage if another such attack does occur.

The numbers have been tallied, and I am pleased to share with you that 99.6% of Tyrrell students completed their summer reading over the break! Tyrrell has been recognized by Governor Lamont's office as a top performing school as it relates to the Governor's Summer Reading Challenge. Top readers will be recognized at an upcoming ceremony with the Governor at the State Library.



Our most recent One School, One Book initiative centered on the book: *Shouting at The Rain* by Lynda Mulally Hunt. In preparation for the author's visit, Tyrrell had a *Shouting at The Rain* thematic day in which all classes incorporated aspects of the book into their own content area. Grade 6 and Grade 7 Granite team designed open-air multidisciplinary integrated activities which afforded students an opportunity to work in teams to produce real world tasks and products related to the books. This included Trip Advisor reviews, science topics related to beach ecosystems, and plotting and locating coordinates.

Award winning author Lynda Mulally Hunt recently visited Tyrrell Middle



School and hosted assemblies for each grade level. At each of the assemblies, Ms. Hunt delivered a message that incorporates a theme of overcoming obstacles and the importance of perseverance in life, as well as, in the writing process. She also shared what she views as the most important components to the writing process. Ms. Hunt was very complimentary of our school and our students. She communicated that she has visited hundreds of schools as a visiting author and that Tyrrell ranks among the top three schools she has visited. 
Wolcott High School:
