- nudge:** to give a gentle push or word of encouragement

FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE

Figurative Language March 2-6

- 1. Alliteration-** the repetition of the first consonant sounds in several words (tongue twisters)
 - Ex.** The sheep should sleep in a shed.
 - Ex.** Garry grumbled as he gathered the garbage.
- 2. Onomatopoeia-** a sound device where the words sound like their meaning, or mimic sounds
 - Ex.** The sheep went, "*Baa.*"
 - Ex.** The sack fell into the river with a *splash!*
- 3. Simile-** compares two unlike things using like or as
 - Ex.** My choir teacher sings like an angel.
 - Ex.** I am as busy as a bee.
- 4. Metaphor-** compares two unlike things without using like or as
 - Ex.** He is a shining star.
 - Ex.** That lawn is a green carpet.
